Department of Energy's Clean Cities Program -

Housed in the Department of Energy's Vehicle Technology Office, there are approximately 75 designated Coalitions like Lone Star Clean Fuels Alliance, Alamo Area Clean Cities, Dallas Fort Worth clean cities, and Houston-Galveston area Clean Cities who across the nation participate in the national <u>Clean Cities Program</u>. Each Coalition is fuel-neutral with an aim to educate businesses, governments and organizations on the options within alternative fueled vehicles, fuel-efficient technologies and energy-efficient mobility systems.

Key Webinar Tips:

- Secure grant approval before proceeding with equipment or vehicle purchases.
- Review grant application prerequisites in advance, and gather all necessary documentation.
 - Although each grant has specific requirements, below are some guidelines for Vehicle Grant Applications.
 - You'll need copies of the old vehicle registration forms for the past two years plus the current year.
 - Color photographs of the vehicle showing the:
 - (1) front,
 - (2) right side,
 - (3) left side,
 - (4) rear,
 - (5) engine, and
 - (6) windshield with current registration.
 - Tires should be included in all photographs and the license plate should be visible.
 - The photographs of the engine should include make, model, engine ID and engine family
 - o W-9 form
 - New vehicle bid signed and dated by your distributor
 - o Title
- Prioritize prompt submission; some grants operate on a first-come, first-served basis and have limited availability.
- Collaborate with another member of your team to minimize errors.
- Sign up for the TCEQ emailed or text updates; and seek assistance from TCEQ staff should any questions arise.
- Develop a strategic plan for your funding and equipment before initiating the grant application process.
- Validate equipment specifications to ensure compliance with government regulations and grant criteria.
